Artist of the Month: Shireen Gastineau

n the dynamic realm of art, Shireen Gastineau stands out as a symbol of creativity and commitment. She also addresses the challenge of gaining recognition for her photo-based art, which is often overshadowed by traditional painting.

Gastineau's advice to emerging artists is to immerse themselves in art daily, explore different forms, and appreciate

the value of craft projects in their artistic development. She stresses the importance of a supportive network, crediting her family and friends for their encouragement. Her upcoming projects are diverse, including exhibitions, a mural commission, and an art class. She also plans to explore art therapy, using art to facilitate emotional healing and expression.


