DCAA BOARD MEMBER HIGHLIGHT BILL LIND, TREASURER FOR DCAA By James Morris


n the picturesque valleys of Oregon, where nature's palette paints the landscapes, Bill Lind has embarked on a remarkable journey of artistic transformation. Known for his remarkable four-decade-long career in photography, Bill has recently shifted his focus towards the tactile world of woodturning, creating exquisite bowls and vessels that tell stories of their own. His role as Treasurer for the Dry Canyon Arts Association (DCAA) has also positioned him at the heart of promoting art within the community, embodying a passion for both creation and cultivation.

Bill's transition from photography

to woodturning was sparked by an intrinsic curiosity and a pivotal life event. "After visiting The Woodturners Museum in Philadelphia, I became curious about woodturning," Bill recalls. However, it was a series of skiing concussions that truly catalyzed his change in focus. "Time for a change!" he declared, trading his skis for a lathe. Under the guidance of renowned woodturner David Ellsworth, Bill found a new creative spark. "David is to the woodturning world what Ansel was to photography," he notes, drawing a parallel to his early photographic inspiration, Ansel Adams.

Bill's photographic career, influenced by the legendary Ansel Adams, laid a foundation of artistic sensitivity that permeates his woodturning. He recounts the absence of formal training with Adams as a "big regret," yet it's clear that his selfdriven passion filled any gaps. His approach to art, shaped by experiences and self-reflection, brings a nuanced appreciation of natural beauty to his current medium.

Bill's creative process in woodturning begins with the log itself—a decision-making journey influenced by its characteristics. "What is the diameter, what color and design to the grain pattern, keep the bark or not?" Bill enumerates the considerations that guide his hands. As he works the wood, unforeseen patterns or flaws might alter his initial design,



making each piece a unique narrative of adaptation and beauty. The most rewarding aspect? "It's kinda like portrait photography," he explains, "as you get better acquainted and peel away the layers, more personality shows up."

As a board member and former Events Co-chair of the DCAA, Bill has set significant goals to foster art's role in local culture. "A major goal of DCAA is to raise awareness of the value of art in our community," he states, emphasizing initiatives like reinstating art programs in schools through funding and donations. His shift from managing events to focusing solely on finances has allowed him to concentrate on enhancing

the association's financial groundwork, ensuring its ability to support community art effectively.

Bill's woodwork can be admired at various local venues, including Arome in Redmond and Hood Avenue Art in Sisters. These partnerships were carefully chosen to align with his artistic style, showcasing his work to an appreciative audience. Looking ahead, Bill is eager to explore new avenues in woodturning, with plans to attend workshops and symposiums that promise to broaden his horizons further.

For aspiring artists, Bill offers a nugget of wisdom: "Community involvement is critical." His journey from displaying work at a local art show to becoming an influential member of the DCAA board exemplifies the profound impact of community engagement. It's not just about art; it's about forming connections and contributing to a larger dialogue.

Bill Lind's artistic evolution from capturing landscapes through lenses to shaping wood on a lathe illustrates a profound narrative of growth and discovery. His commitment to both his craft and community serves as an inspiring testament to the transformative power of art. As he continues to explore and expand his talents, Bill's legacy within the Dry Canyon Arts Association and beyond is sure to be as enduring as the pieces he creates. •
