ARTIST OF THE MONTH NATURE'S BRUSHSTROKES THE ARTISTIC JOURNEY OF SUSAN LEES By James Morris

In the quaint, vibrant world of Susan Lees, art and nature intertwine in a dance as old as time, yet as fresh as the morning dew on a rural farm. Susan, with a background deeply rooted in the pastoral serenity of the countryside, grew up surrounded by farm animals and spent her days riding horses, fostering an innate love for all creatures great and small. This artistic voyage is not without its challenges, however. Transitioning to painting full-time after retirement, Susan found that maintaining the discipline to paint daily required the same
